### Context

The legislative cycle has come to be viewed as a part of the broader "policy cycle".

The decade spanning 2004 – 2014 brought the Lisbon Treaty but also brought:

- Increased focus on implementation
- New stronger emphasis on impact assessment

## Evolution of the Legislative Cycle

- 1999-2004: 405 codecision procedures, 28% First Reading agreements
- 2004-2009: 447 codecision procedures, 72% First Reading agreements
- 2009-2014: 456 codecision procedures, 84%
   First Reading agreements


# Policy Cycle (1)

- The European Commission has increasingly adopted a 'Policy cycle' approach, developed and refined since Better Law-making Inter-Institutional Agreement in 2003, comprising impact assessment, planning, initiation, process, transposition and implementation and evaluation;
- Impact assessment has become a critically important tool, controlled within the Commission by its Impact Assessment Board, developed into a model of best practice;
- Development of the philosophy of the "Refit" Communication on Regulatory Fitness and performance, with regular evaluation of programmes and simplification.
- New policy leadership role of the European Council

# Policy Cycle (2)

- A broader, scrutiny-based approach from European Parliament
- The EP welcomes the emphasis on the importance of a policy cycle: 'with the initiation, impact assessment, consultation, enactment, implementation and evaluation stages of EU legislation being seen as part of a coherent process"
- The April 2011 Niebler report on "guaranteeing independent impact assessments" called for more consistent use of impact assessment as an aid to the decision-making process within Parliament, notably with regard to substantive amendments"
- This led to the creation of a dedicated Directorate for Impact Assessment and European Added Value.

### Commitment to Better Regulation

- ➤ the Bureau of Parliament decided in July 2011 to create a Directorate for Impact Assessment and EU Added Value, which was set up in January 2012
- The Directorate has six units: Ex-Ante and Ex-post Impact Assessment, European Added Value, Policy Performance Appraisal, European Council Oversight and Scientific and Technological Foresight (STOA).
- Since November 2013, the Directorate is part of the newly-created Directorate General for European Parliamentary Research Services (EPRS)

### Mission of the new Services

- To provide Members with independent, objective and authoritative analysis of impact assessment and European Added Value issues;
- To strengthen the ability of Parliament to identify where common European action, or better coordination of existing national and European policies, can be more cost-effective or help realise a collective 'public good'. This can be seen as a valuable contribution to Better Regulation and evidence-based policy making.
- To reinforce the European Parliament's capacity for scrutiny and oversight, to strengthen its influence on policy formulation and development, to improve the quality of legislation itself

# Development of parliamentary agenda-setting and scrutiny

- Complementary Impact assessment and Impact assessment of amendments to improve the evidence-base of decisions during the legislative phase
- Indirect right of initiative under Article 225 TFEU and legislative own-initiative reports to provide input at the phase of initiation
- Implementation reports as an evaluation mechanism for parliamentary committees
- Monitoring of commitments by the European Council

# Impact Assessment Services in the European Parliament

- Initial appraisals of Commission Impact Assessments
- Detailed appraisal of a Commission Impact Assessment
- Impact Assessment on substantive amendments being considered by the Parliament (carried out by external experts);
- Complementary or substitute Impact Assessments
- Ex post Impact Assessment analysing implementation;

Guidelines for Committees

#### I. Preliminary considerations

1. The European Parliament shares with the Council and Commission the determination to and responsibility for improving the quality of legislation applicable throughout the Union. The Inter-Institutional Agreement on Better Law-Making,<sup>2</sup> which enshrines that joint commitment, identifies impact assessments as one of the tools which can help the institutions achieve the goal of clear, simple and effective legislation.

For the purpose of this Handbook, impact assessments are deemed to be ex-ante analyses of the likely or foreseeable effects of draft EU legislation or policies proposed for adoption at European Union level, as defined in the Inter-Institutional Common Approach to Impact Assessments of July 2006<sup>3</sup>, and which may be undertaken at successive stages in the legislation process.

- 2. In that connection, Parliament has given two undertakings, reiterated in a number of
  - to take full account of the Commission's impact assessments<sup>5</sup>.

# EP policy priorities for Impact Assessment (1)

- Since the 2011 Niebler report, Parliament's views on Better Regulation have been expressed in yearly resolutions, most recently the Karim report on EU Regulatory Fitness and Subsidiarity and Proportionality (P7\_TA(2014)0061). The resolution of 4 February 2014:
- calls for re-negotiating and updating the 2003 Inter-institutional Agreement on Better Law-making to take account of the Treaty of Lisbon and to consolidate current best practices, while recommending that any new agreement should be of a binding nature;
- Encourages the three main European institutions to work together on better regulation, with the essential contribution of the Committee of the Regions and the Economic and Social Committee on territorial aspects

# EP policy priorities for Impact Assessment (2)

- A 'white paper' stage in the legislative process;
- Affording stakeholders the ability to comment on draft proposals and accompanying provisional impact assessments would improve the quality of the draft legislation presented by the Commission
- Complete consistency between the impact assessment published by the Commission and the contents of the legislative proposal as adopted by the College of Commissioners;
- Automatically updating the Impact Assessments to reflect the changes made by the College of Commissioners;
- In principle, only finalise and present legislative proposals where they
  have been approved with a favourable opinion by the Impact Assessment
  Board.














### DG EPRS contribution

### Agenda setting phase

The creation of an in-house capability is designed to enhance Parliament's institutional independence and to help the European Parliament "to identify, quantify and justify its overall policy priorities"

Agenda-setting approaches for the new legislative period include:

- the *Political Work Programme*, collating input from Committees on reports requiring follow-up or where EP requests have not been fully met;
- Mapping the Cost of non-Europe
- Cost of Non Europe reports as requested by Committees
- European Added Value Assessments requested by Committees

## Cost of non-Europe

- The idea of there being a 'cost of non-Europe' was first pioneered in the European Parliament in the early 1980s through the Albert-Ball Report that paved the way for the relaunch of the single market by Commission President Jacques Delors.
- The Cecchini report, written in 1988, estimated a cost of non-Europe for the Single market at 200 billion ECU in "the potential for gains".




