

## Background to Alternatives to Legislation

- ▶ Legislation can appear to be a solution with relatively low costs for government
- ▶ It can seem the most familiar and lowest risk option available to policy-makers to address a problem
- ▶ Reality:
  - legislation is never cost-free
  - for government or those being regulated.

## Background to Alternatives to Legislation

### Legislation:

- ▶ Can be **ineffective** in achieving intended outcomes if its effects on the system as a whole have not been properly considered.
- ▶ If details of proposed implementation have not been thought through, including:
  - the costs to the economy, environment and society
  - the potential impact of enforcementthe burden of regulation can be much higher than necessary.

**Hastily conceived legislation may be unenforceable and could be more harmful than doing nothing.**

## Background to Alternatives to Legislation

- **Policy makers must identify the most effective approach to achieving a desired policy outcome by:**
  - ensuring alternative approaches to legislation are thoroughly explored, and
  - that traditional 'command and control' regulation is seen as the last, not first, resort.

# Examples of Alternatives to 'Command and Control' Regulation

- ▶ **Self-regulation**
- ▶ **Co-regulation**
- ▶ **Information and Education**
- ▶ **Economic Instruments**
- ▶ **Behavioural Economics**
- ▶ **No New Intervention**

## Self - Regulation

An approach initiated and undertaken by those whose behaviour is to be regulated.

*For example, an industry or profession might choose to develop and adopt its own code of practice promoting ethical conduct.*

### Examples

- Unilateral codes of conduct
- Customer charter
- Unilateral sector codes
- Negotiated codes

## Co-regulation

Similar to self-regulation but involves some degree of explicit government involvement.

*For example, an industry might work with government to develop a code of practice - usually will be enforced by the industry itself, or a professional organisation, rather than by government.*

### Examples

- **Recognised Codes**
- **Statutory Codes (MEL)**
- **Approved Codes**
- **Voluntary Agreements**
- **Trade Association Codes approved by Govt (OFT)**
- **Accreditation Standards**

## Information and Education:

**Can be used to empower consumers to take their own informed decisions.**

### **Examples**

- **Inform, enhance consumer choice**
- **Independent recommendation schemes**
- **Ratings systems**
- **Labelling, disclosure**

## Economic Instruments

**Can be used to modify behaviour by adjusting the economic incentives facing businesses and citizens.**

*This approach allows individuals to make their own decisions, based on their estimates of whether the benefits of acting in a certain way justify the costs.*

### Examples

- Taxes
- Subsidies
- Quotas and permits
- Vouchers
- Auctions
- Competition





## No New Intervention

**In many instances, it might not be necessary for government to initiate new action at all.**

*Legislation and its alternatives will almost always impose costs as well as generating benefits, so policy makers should think carefully about whether action by government is required at all.*

### Examples

- Use existing legislation
- Simplify or clarify existing legislation
- Improved enforcement of existing legislation
- Make legal remedies more accessible or cheaper
- Do nothing at all



## So – Why aren't Alternatives used more widely?


- Lack of knowledge of alternatives

# Impediments to alternatives to legislation





## Overcoming Impediments

- Policy making process that is supportive and encouraging of the use of alternatives & their consideration at an early stage
- Asking whether regulation is the best form of government action
- Integration of alternative approaches in RIA
- Cultural change:
  - Process needs to be supported by information
  - Gradually extend requirements for alternatives to be considered
  - Ensure information is widely available & publicised

## Checklist for Considering Alternatives

1. What are the objectives the policy instrument is trying to achieve?
2. What are the incentives for those whose behaviour would be affected?
3. How much industry (or profession) specific information is required to ensure effective regulation?
4. Is the area subject to rapid change?
5. Are there likely to be significant equity or fairness concerns?


